

Vision Statement

Access without barriers for all Africans to Acudetox treatment principles for substance abuse and emotional distress.

Our Mission

To apply and put into practice the Acudetox principles that attracts, empower and retain clients in treatment. To establish a solid network of organizations and individuals throughout Africa that fosters successful client recovery and sense of well being.

Who We Are

NADA stands for the National Acupuncture Detoxification Association and is a catalyst for social development. After NADA comes in and provides training and consultation, the acupuncture treatment programs are run by local agencies. "Nada" in Spanish, means "nothing." It signifies a drug-free, no-nonsense approach. Acupuncture detoxification is inexpensive, drug-free and popular in most cultural circumstances. A clinic can be established in any location where people sit in a group.

What we seek to achieve

Understanding the principles of both Chinese medicine and chemical dependency can lead to significant benefit in recovery from all forms of drug addiction as well as alcoholism and a variety of mental disorders. NADA protocols, especially designed for this type of treatment, have been carefully developed and extensively tested. More than 1,500 clinical sites in the US, Europe, Australia, and the Caribbean currently utilize these protocols, even in settings where threats of violence had previously made it difficult to serve clients. While initially adapted to western attitudes and conditions the NADA method will also be adapted to African, including Nigerian attitudes and conditions. Our best hope for success is unified application and mutual appreciation of diverse treatment approaches.

NADA promotes this goal through:

1. Public education about acupuncture as a recovery tool for substance abuse and emotional distress.
2. Training and certification of professionals and caring individuals about use of the techniques.
3. Consultation with local organizations in setting up treatment and training sites.
4. Sharing of NADA approved information with all interested parties.

Kenneth Carter, MD





Superior Court System Drug Diversion Program and has worked with the National Institutes of Health-Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (NIH-CSAT) in developing guidelines for the use of acupuncture in drug abuse treatment and recovery. As a medical student, Dr. Carter began his acupuncture education in 1982 under the tutelage of his friend and mentor Dr. Michael Smith, long-standing Director of the exemplary Lincoln Acupuncture Recovery Center. Dr. Carter is an acupuncture detoxification specialist (ADS)

J. Arthur Pinkney is currently the Associate Administrator for Behavioral Medicine at Jackson Park Hospital. He received his Master's Degree in Clinical Psychology from Roosevelt University in Chicago, IL and his Bachelor's Degree in Psychology from Claremont McKenna College in Claremont, CA. He has worked in Behavioral Healthcare for the past 24 years. Mr. Pinkney is a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor (LCPC)

and has become an expert in the treatment of persons with both a mental illness and substance abuse (MISA) disorder. He is on the advisory board of the Illinois MISA Institute and was an expert panelist in the role delineation study being conducted to develop a competency exam for MISA certification in Illinois. He is one of the Co-chairpersons of the South Shore/Chatham (Chicago) MISA Consortium Steering Committee. As an Acupuncture Detoxification Specialist he sat on the Board of Directors of the National Acupuncture Detoxification Association (NADA) for three years and is a NADA Registered Trainer.



Michael O. Smith, MD.,

Dr. Michael O. Smith is a psychiatrist, acupuncturist, addiction specialist and public health planner who has been the Director of Lincoln Hospital Substance Abuse Division since 1974. He graduated Wesleyan University and University of California Medical School in San Francisco. He is an Assistant Professor at New York Medical College and is certified by the American Society of Addiction Medicine. Dr. Smith is internationally known for developing the use of acupuncture in the field of chemical dependency. More than 1,500 treatment programs worldwide use the Lincoln Hospital model. As Chairperson of the National Acupuncture Detoxification Association (NADA), Dr. Smith provided consultation to city, county, state, federal, and United Nations agencies in more than 100 settings. Dr. Smith has been a principal co-investigator on research studies conducted by the New York State Department of Health, Columbia University, and private sector research institutions. In addition to his work with acupuncture and substance abuse, Dr. Smith is known for his expertise in, clinical toxicology, herbology, community psychiatry, medical information systems, treatment of multiple sclerosis, Chinese philosophy, and addiction treatment planning. His five-year study on the use of Chinese Medicine in the treatment of AIDS has been published in many countries. Dr. Smith conducts a weekly acupuncture clinic for AIDS patients at the Gay Men's Health Crisis in Manhattan. Dr. Smith was presented with the Samuel and May Rudin Community Service Award by Mayor Dinkins. He was named Acupuncturist of the year by AAAOM, and serves on the Governor's Advisory Council on Substance Abuse. Dr. Smith is a principle sponsor of NADA Africa.

About NADA

NADA is a not-for-profit organization, which relies primarily on volunteers. NADA Membership dues are locally determined and go to pay for local operational expenses. Training is carried out by one or more NADA Registered Trainers. Training involves understanding the principles of acupuncture treatment, drug and alcohol problems and mental health. Trainees are given direct experience of giving the NADA protocol, which includes gaining proficiency in the 5-point ear acupuncture treatment. Training is normally delivered over a full week with two days intensive workshop followed by five days clinical supervision of practice. Trainees must complete a set number of supervised treatments to complete the course.

Brief History of Acudetox

The understanding of how life sustaining energy or "Chi" moves through our bodies can be traced back to ancient Africa. At the foundation of this understanding is the knowledge that everything in the universe is susceptible to balancing forces. The assumption is that illness, disease, emotional distress are evidence of imbalance. Our minds and bodies innately seek balance and naturally include mechanisms that help us heal and move from imbalance to balance. Our ancient African ancestors understood this and developed medical systems that took advantage of and facilitated these natural balancing forces. This knowledge traveled eastward and became the basis of what is now known as acupuncture. Thousands of years later in 1972, a neurosurgeon in Hong Kong, Dr. H. L. When accidentally discovered that acupuncture was very effective in treating withdrawal symptoms associated with opium addiction. His discovery attracted the attention of Dr. Michael Smith and others at Lincoln Hospital in New York City. At the time they operated a community based methadone clinic that was established at the urging of two progressive community groups (the Black Panthers and Young Lords). The idea of using acupuncture was embraced by the clients of the clinic. Over the next few years the use of acupuncture was refined based upon feedback from those receiving the treatment and resulted in the development of the NADA Acudetox Protocol. The NADA Acudetox Protocol is the use of the five ear points in the context of compassionate and nonjudgmental programming that includes the acupuncture, group counseling and education, individual counseling, and support groups.

OUR SPONSORS

CMHC, founded in 1975 by African Americans, is a comprehensive community mental health center with its main office located in Chicago. Its President and

CEO is internationally known psychiatrist, Dr. Carl Bell. Dr. Bell first introduced Acudetox and the NADA Protocol to CMHC in 1987 after learning the approach himself during a visit to Lincoln Hospital and Dr. Michael Smith. CMHC's Acudetox Training Program, under the leadership of Jan Dele Osawe has firmly established CMHC as a leader in the Acudetox movement. CMHC welcomes its role as the United States office for NADA Africa and sees the opportunity to reach out to the continent of Africa as an extension of the heart of its mission to "Save Lives."

The interactive section commenced at 10:30 a.m. with the introduction of members of the hospital and the team from USA. The programme is expected to commence on Monday, February 16, 2004 and end on Friday, February 20, 2004. Participants from Edo State, Delta State were also expected to attend.

Objective of the Team's Visit

To introduce and establish NADA Protocol in Nigeria with the possibility that Nigeria will be the Headquarters for NADA Africa.

Preamble

The NADA, USA team reconvened at the conference hall of the hospital to demonstrate acudetox treatment on the staffers that deal with drug patients.

The Medical Director, Dr. I. O. Malomo in his opening remark welcomed the NADA team and members of staff to the impromptu meeting.

He appealed to participants to receive an acupuncture treatment in order to improve their knowledge on Drug Abuse Management.

The CMHC Training Coordinator thanked the Medical Director for accepting their visit to the hospital.

She then enlightened the staff concerned on NADA Acudetox Protocol. They were informed that Acupuncture technique communicates to all parts of one's body (energetic) and is involved in healing and recovery. The ear is a representative of the entire system and as such the protocol was observed in the ear where the needle points were made.

The demonstration was conducted with about 30 participants.

Procedure

- i. Participants sat down.
- ii. Cleaning of both ears in readiness for the needle points
- iii. Making the needle points five (5) points on each ear. When a needle point was being inserted the participant was advised to breath out.
- iv. Participants sit for thirty-five (35) minutes.
- v. Excessive noise was restricted from non-participants and GSM phone were turned off in order to facilitate the atmosphere of mutually respectful quiet.
- vi. After 35 minutes, the needles were carefully removed and disposed of in the "Imperulous containers" provided.

Questions from Participants

- i. How will the hospital get the supply for the Acupodox instrument?
- ii. Why are some participants more relaxed than the others? Am I supposed to be relaxed?
- iii. Why are some points more tender than others?
- iv. What will be the effect of the points in the participants?


The exercise lasted till 3.00 p.m. on that day - February, 10 2004.

Acupuncture - Detoxification Conference holds in Nigeria








